Other examples of Abrahamic faiths (other than Islam, Judaism and Christianity) include the Jehovah's Witness (https://www.britannica.com/topic/Jehovahs-Witnesses) – a likely adjustment for a Johova's Witness might be surrounding healthcare, due to scripture referring to the banning of consumption of blood, meaning that they will not accept blood transfusions.

Druze (https://www.britannica.com/topic/Druze)

Rastafari (https://www.britannica.com/topic/Rastafari) – a likely dietary requirement for Rastafarians might be a vegetarian meal due to the keeping of I-tal which means natural and clean. They might also be more likely to enjoy a cup of herbal tea rather than a cup of coffee as it is more in line with the keeping of I-tal.

Baha'l Faith (https://www.britannica.com/topic/Bahai-Faith)

Yazidi (https://www.britannica.com/topic/Yazidi) – a dietary requirement for Yazidis for example is that they may choose not to eat lettuce, as the Kurdish word for lettuce is 'Khas' which the Yazidis use to denote their saints and a reasonable adjustment might be allowing them to pray outside as they pray in the direction of the sun.
